##### **1.2. Position-fixing in international business**

The term “business ethics” refers to ethics pertaining to companies or organisations. Applied ethics is based first and foremost on general ethics. This is derived from classical virtues as well as theories of justice. Business ethics is concerned with the moral evaluation of economic systems and attempts to evince cooperative approaches for any dissent which arises. This is important above all because criticism of the capitalist-dominated economic system, but also of the market-based model and of companies, is increasing, meaning that normative orientational knowledge with a view to the overall economic context is gaining in significance. The focus here is on the question of whether moral norms and ideals are effective or can be implemented in today’s business world. An extended approach to economy is required, including a set of rules for business ethics. This thus raises the question of how norms can be justified or in what sense economic consequences of moral behaviour are the object of business ethics.

##### **1.3. Course aims and learning outcomes**

- The course will examine an introduction to the ethics of philosophers such as Plato, Aristotle, Thomas Aquinas, Immanuel Kant, Georg Wilhelm Friedrich Hegel, Karl Marx, David Hume and John Rawls. However, it also broaches the issue of the ethical implications of globalisation.

- The course refers to social justice and sustainability, which play a central role in business ethics.
- The course aims to increase awareness of and sensitivities to moral aspects, which are required from business for professionals on the daily basis, both as a reflective competency and when recognising particular situations.
- The course thematises the competencies required by managers in their roles when navigating a normative discourse between business and civil society.
- The course demonstrates to future managers the methods by which they can develop an ethos which builds on integrity and fundamental obligations according to morals and professional obligations.
- The course is intended to provide future managers with an understanding and successful navigation of the challenges posed by the markets to ethical corporate behaviour and to discuss proposed ethical approaches from the perspective of professional corporate responsibility in an international setting.

## **1.4 Course requirements and grading**

### **Requirements**

Students are required to attend no less than 80% of classes and be prepared for class discussions.

Reading of the required materials and active engagement in class discussions are expected. Always read and think about assigned reading materials before class. Perceptive observations and thoughtful questions contribute equally to a good discussion. Be ready to discuss current events in the economic field, e.g. company strategies. Each student will give a fifteen-minute presentation. There will be two student presentations and small or whole-group discussion at each seminar class.
